Speaking of success, I'm proud to share that, for the first time, all five Freedom Prep schools in Memphis have been named Level 5 schools by the state, a designation that honors exceptional student growth year-over-year. You'll find

While we are excited about our Level 5 achievement, our work is far from over. Driven by our commitment to preparing students to excel in college and in life, we must continue to help them grow and thrive, equipping them to lead and shape the joyful, choice-filled future they deserve.

Academics, our Foundation

It's been an exciting year of academic growth for Freedom Prep in both Memphis and Birmingham. We have faced the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic and have made remarkable strides. In fact, English Language Arts (ELA) scores in our Memphis schools have surpassed our pre-COVID performance.

"Each of our schools is making significant growth year after year," said Tiffany Moore, Chief of Academics. "And our current data shows that, midway through the '24-'25 school year, we are already on track to surpass how we performed last year. That's extremely exciting to think about."

Data and a dose of love: The view from a Head of School

It's unusual to find Natasha Smith, the Head of School at Whitehaven Middle at Brownlee, in her office. She's usually moving through the halls, laptop in hand and teaching materials at the ready, fully engaged with her students.

"When I arrived (in 2022), I wanted to raise the bar on, number one, teacher pedagogy and curriculum but also on student engagement and performance. One of my strengths is relationships, so you'll see me in the hallway ... my students know they're loved."

But they also know that Smith is always aware of how they're doing, with a clear understanding of their progress. "I'm

teaching them that they are excellent but I'm always talking to them about data – 'I saw you moved up!' I know what they did for TCAP, on their last assessments. On every door, in every classroom, you see data. Every conversation is about data." At Freedom Prep, data drives every decision we make, ensuring that we continually support and challenge our students to reach their full potential.

When visitors come to her school, she wants them to see "the J-factor, which is joy. And a hundred percent of classes engaged in rigorous academic content. I want them to see systems, meaning this is what these people do every day."

She also wants families to recognize that a free public charter school can offer the same level of academic excellence as a private school.

"Then we add a dose of love with it – I think every child in this building will tell you that. That's what makes us who we are."

Though the Freedom Prep - Birmingham Campus has only been open for less than a year, Head of School Jessica Ramey is hard at work establishing the school's academic excellence.


"Because we are small and have so many adults here, we have been able to build our small group literacy instruction," she said. "We're able to grow students, target any deficits immediately and also include our special education students so they are able to grasp the material the teacher is teaching."

She is seeing great progress: Students are supposed to master letter names and sounds by the end of the first semester, but "our students had already reached that monumental moment by November. I was super-excited, because now we can start reading and decoding words."


In addition to pushing her students and teachers to continue to exceed state standards, the college-prep focus of Freedom Prep is built into everything we do in Alabama.

> Classrooms are named for local colleges – currently Alabama A&M and Jacksonville State University – and students learn to understand and set goals for the week, a skill that will set them up for college success down the road. They'll be part of a college tour of the University of

Alabama at Birmingham later in the year.



Families, too, are learning the ways Freedom Prep prepares their students to read and learn at home. "A lot of our families speak to their child's growing independence," she said. "I think they understand and appreciate what we're trying to do here."

If you asked students at Brownlee Middle and High to point out Tehron Thompson, they might not know who you were referring to. But mention Mama T, and everyone knows exactly who you mean.

"Kids are one of my passions," she said. "I feel like I'm a mama bear of the school."

Thompson's daughter Teghan is a member of the Class of 2025, having started at Freedom Prep in third grade when Roderick Barber, now principal at Freedom Prep High at Brownlee, was her teacher. Her son, now graduated from another high school, began at Freedom Prep in sixth grade. Those long-standing connections are part of what gives Mama T her deep understanding of what makes Freedom Prep truly special.

"Freedom Prep is a community, a family. At Freedom Prep they care about the kids and they care a lot. I've heard and seen situations myself where I say, yeah, that teacher went to the mat for this student."

You'll often see Mama T cheering from the sidelines at basketball and volleyball games, fetching missing socks for one student, or bringing personal hygiene products for another, always ready to check on the students.


The first thing you notice when you meet Randy Chavez is that the lanyard holding his employee ID badge is covered with pins. These are the same pins he wore on his blazer lapel when he was a student at Freedom Prep: National Honor Society, honor pins for English and biology, a gold star.

"The reason I wear these is for the students, so they can see that it's an honor to show off what you do in school," he said. "They always ask me about them."

Chavez started at Freedom Prep in seventh grade, following in the footsteps of his cousins. Along with his four siblings, he became part of the Freedom Prep family – two of them are still students here today.

"I love the mission, honestly, that tells kids that they can go to college," he said. "Coming from different schools, I never felt pushed at all. But at Freedom Prep we had homework every day and it was a safe environment. I could talk to my teachers and ask for help, because English wasn't my first language."

Today, Chavez is a voice for other Latino families, helping bridge the culture of Freedom Prep by explaining community circles and college field trips, both of which were highlights of his own time as a student. "In our community circles, we give each other shout-outs to represent our core values, including community and respect," he explains. Chavez wants families to know that Freedom Prep is here to support and offer resources. "My work here brings me a lot of joy," he said. "It makes me feel like I'm actually making a difference."
